

TIMOTHY J. FLANAGAN became the 15th President of Framingham State College, a member of the Massachusetts State College system, on August 1, 2006.

The College was founded in 1839 by Horace Mann, and is the nation's oldest public college established for the education of teachers. Framingham State is a vibrant, comprehensive liberal arts and sciences college offering 25 undergraduate degree programs in arts, humanities, sciences, social sciences, and professional fields. Nearly 6,000 students attend Framingham State, including nearly 2,000 graduate students. Framingham State College offers graduate degrees in 23 fields, including an extensive graduate program for teachers in international schools. The College's annual operating budget is \$50 million, and has 460 employees including 170 full time faculty members. The College takes pride in its 28,000 alumni, most of whom live and work in Massachusetts.

From 1998 to 2006, Dr. Flanagan was Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs of the State University of New York College at Brockport. As Provost he was the chief academic officer, overseeing the academic development of the campus and the allocation of resources within the college's largest division. Working with the deans of the campus schools, College Senate leadership and other vice presidents, he helped guide SUNY Brockport through a period of substantial development. He was also a Professor in the Department of Criminal Justice.

Prior to joining SUNY Brockport, President Flanagan was on the faculties of Marshall University, the State University of New York at Albany, and Sam Houston State University. For seven years he was Dean of the College of Criminal Justice and Director of the Criminal Justice Center at Sam Houston State. He received the University of Cincinnati Award from the American Probation and Parole Association in 1998 for "outstanding contribution to the field of Corrections in the United States and Canada."

Timothy Flanagan is the editor or co-editor of three anthologies and fifteen reference volumes, and forty journal and law review articles about crime, justice, and public policy. He was honored by the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences with the Academy Fellow Award for "distinguished teaching and scholarly achievement" and is a Distinguished Alumnus of the Nelson A. Rockefeller College of Public Affairs and Policy of the State University of New York. He has served as the Director of the Criminal Justice Research Center (a non-profit research organization in New York) and as consultant to numerous Federal and State criminal justice agencies and higher education institutions and organizations.

Dr. Flanagan is an alumnus of the American Council of Education Fellows Program and the Harvard University Institute of Educational Management and the Harvard New Presidents Seminar. He has delivered invited lectures throughout the United States, and at leading universities in Austria, Belgium, China, Ireland, Mexico, Scotland and Australia. He maintains an active interest in his research specialization centering on public opinion and public policy, and in higher education.
