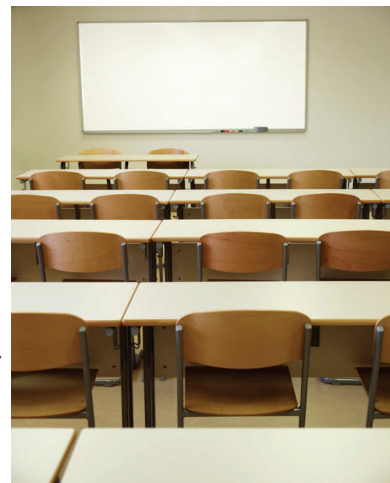


# Academic Success 101

## What is Academic Success 101?

*Academic Success 101* is a semester-long program designed to enhance the academic performance of first-year students. Whether you are on probation for the first time or whether you just want to improve your academic skills, the program will help you take responsibility for your own educational experience. ## What is Academic Probation?

A student is placed on academic probation when his or her cumulative grade point average (CGPA) falls below the level required for good academic standing. A student placed on probation is granted one semester to improve academically.

As shown below, the minimum CGPA required depends on the number of credit-bearing courses the student has completed at Framingham State University with a letter grade other than a W, plus the number of transfer courses accepted for credit.

Number of courses completed (includes transfer courses)	Minimum CGPA
1-8	1.70
9 or more	2.00
