# **Program Assessment Plan for Criminology (2021-2026)**

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#### 1) PROGRAM MISSION STATEMENT

The Bachelor of Arts with a major in Criminology is a sociologically oriented baccalaureate program grounded in a strong liberal arts curriculum. This program introduces students to three important dimensions of criminology: 1) the role of law and legal systems; 2) social/structural dimensions of crime; 3) individual/behavioral dimensions of crime.

While this program will undoubtedly attract students interested in criminal-legal system careers, the major is intended to introduce students to a broader array of career opportunities beyond that provided by training in criminal justice. Students studying criminology at Framingham State learn to approach crime from a theoretically informed and research-based perspective. Our program understands "crime" and criminalization as social constructs and examines the underlying social inequalities that shape the responses to and experiences of crime. Furthermore, the program highlights how structures of power: such as racism and white supremacy, have influenced social control and punishment through present-day. Students implement creative thought about the role of social action in transforming criminal-legal policy and responding to harm.

- IV. Assess causes and consequences of social inequality and power as they relate to crime, criminal behavior, and the criminal-legal system. [Evaluation]
