Articulate relationships	The English Department Assessment Committee collected final essays from ENGL 204 (our introduction to the major course), several 300-level courses, and ENGL 422 (Senior Seminar). We used a rubric to determine proficiency of each of the objectives based on the artifacts.	Initial data for Goal 1 was collected at the conclusion of the fall 2016 semester. That initial information was run through “R” in spring 2017 and provided a breakdown of the data. There was not enough data for statistically significant analysis. Additional data was collected for Goal 1 at the end of the spring 2017 semester. The committee’s intention was to analyze that data during the summer but without a renewed contract that process is currently paused.	The English Department Assessment Committee annually interprets the data using “R” as our programming language to sort and analyze.	The English Department just completed the first year of a five-year assessment cycle, so we have not made any changes to the curriculum or program at this time. Based on our experience assessing Goal 1, the Assessment Committee continues to revise the learning goals and objectives to ensure that they are framed in a way that makes them assessable.	The last program review took place in 2012. The English Department is scheduled for a program review this academic year.
